

Grant funds equipment during oppressive summer 2022 drought

One of the driest summers on record provided many area farmers and ranchers with extraordinary challenges in 2022. These otherwise resilient folks saw large cracks open in pastures before their very eyes. Ponds dried up and crops withered in the field from early June right through the late summer months.

Local meteorologists offered little hope. They repeated the same dismal message day after day.

"No precipitation in the forecast... high temperatures... low humidity... windy again with high fire spread rates."

Days turned to weeks and weeks turned to months with no relief in sight.

"The faucet shut off for a long while," said Tulsa's News On 6 Meteorologist Stephen Nehrenz describing conditions here in northeast Oklahoma last summer. "We had a month-long stretch in there that was some of the driest on record. From June 11 to July 11 was our second driest on record for that period. The 45-day stretch from June 11 to July 26 was our third driest on record for that period. Those are arbitrary dates, but it does help illustrate how and why our drought was so bad this summer."

The heat was no joke either, explained Nehrenz.

"We ended up with twenty 100° days in July, which was sixth most on record (reliable temperature records for Tulsa go back to 1905). When you take into account the average temperature for the entire month (the averages of all the highs and lows of each day), the entire month of July was our seventh hottest July on record. For June and July combined, the twenty-two 100° days is ninth most on record."

Even with a summer-long burn ban in effect, most area response agencies found themselves sitting on pins and needles. They approached each day with caution, hoping for a break. They knew that once started, a fire wouldn't be easily contained.

"The weather has been a definite problem this year," Chief of Centralia Volunteer Fire Company Shawn Christian said during a November 2022 interview. "The grass is extremely dry and very receptive to fire. Luckily, in our area, there have been very few fires at this point, whether that is because of the burn ban or just people in our area understand the situation and aren't taking any chances."

Added Christian: "We have responded to fires with other fire departments in their respective areas—not because they couldn't handle the fire but out of an abundance of caution. We all know that conditions are ripe for a fire to get out of hand quickly and require more resources than are available in that area—whether it be trucks or manpower. We have a saying that it's better to be there or enroute and not needed than to be needed and be nowhere around."

While they can't do anything to change the weather, Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative members have been happy to help local fire departments gear up for an emergency. Through the Operation Round-Up program, NOEC members provided Centralia firefighters a \$3,526 grant to purchase a new SCBA (self-contained breathing apparatus). SCBAs deliver compressed, breathable air in oxygen-deficient atmospheres that present an immediate danger to life or health.

"The new SCBA was placed on one of our firstout grass trucks," said Christian. "We have responded to grass fires in the past that have evolved and ignited structures. By adding SCBAs to our grass trucks, our firefighters have one of the most needed tools—besides water—for attacking a structure fire: a source of clean air. This equipment is what a firefighter wears on his back and supplies the air needed to walk into heavy smoke. It also allows us to run smaller, safer trucks to mutual aid structure fires where manpower is needed more than big trucks and heavy equipment."

NOEC introduced the Operation Round-Up program in 1998 with the slogan Small Change that Changes Lives. That description is no less fitting today. Over the past 24 years, Operation Round-Up has allocated more than \$3 million to causes throughout its service territory of Craig, Mayes, Delaware, Ottawa and Rogers counties.

Operation Round-Up does just what its name implies. Each month, electric bills of participating members is simply rounded up to the next highest dollar. The average contribution is 50 cents per month and totals around \$6 on an annual basis. For example, a bill of \$52.73 would be rounded up to \$53 with the additional 27 cents going to Operation Round-Up.

CAPITAL CREDIT RETIREMENT AUTHORIZED

Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative's Board of Trustees authorized the distribution of \$1,349,978 in capital credits. Capital credit represents member equity in the cooperative.

Current and former members who received electric service from the cooperative in 1989, 1990, and 2021 are eligible for a retirement. Checks were mailed to eligible members on September 1, 2022, for their portion of the credit retired.

HOW CAPITAL CREDITS WORK



NOEC tracks how much electricity you purchase and how much you pay for service throughout the year.



Then, we pay operating costs for things like power generation, maintenance, depreciation, and taxes.



Any remaining operating revenue is then allocated as capital credits to NOEC members.



Capital credits are accumulated under each unique member and retired (paid out) on a rotation cycle.



As NOEC's financial condition permits, your board of trustees decides to retire and pay out capital credits TO YOU!

HOW DO I RECEIVE MY CAPITAL CREDIT RETIREMENT?



CHECK PAYMENT

Members receive capital credits as a CHECK. A \$10 minimum must be met before checks are written.

COULD BE YOURS

Checks totaling \$10 or more have been mailed to eligible members. Checks were not mailed to members whose patronage capital accounts totaled less than \$10. These accounts will continue to accumulate funds with each retirement. When an account reaches \$10 or more, a check will be issued following the next retirement. NOEC makes every effort to ensure members receive patronage capital that is rightfully theirs. To accomplish this, it is important for NOEC to have your current mailing address. Checks are often returned marked "undeliverable." Many of these do not have the correct 911 address. A partial listing of unclaimed checks is provided here. SPRING BREAK ENERGY EFFICIENCY TIPS

Over the river and through the woods to grandmother's house you go. But before you leave for vacation, make sure your home is prepared. Instead of just locking the door and stopping delivery of the newspaper, there are many items on a vacation checklist that will not only keep your home safe from an electrical fire, but also reduce the amount of energy being used. Before you depart, walk though the house and look for electronics and appliances and ask yourself, does this need to be on, or even plugged in? Those questions will help you raise your electrical safety and improve your energy efficiency.

In the kitchen, your toaster is plugged in, as well as the blender, maybe a coffee machine, and of course the stove and microwave. If an unexpected power surge or lightning bolt struck your home, one or more of those could be damaged by the higher voltage and could cause a fire. The same goes for your computer. They should be unplugged while you are away.

Will anyone be watching the television, playing video games, or using smart home devices? You hope not, so unplug them and save your money from the phantom power draw that keeps them warmed up and ready to come on at the click of a remote or voice-command. At least 10% of the utility bill for a typical home can be attributed to the electronic devices that are eager to serve you and are always at the ready. Give them a rest and vacation as well.

Law enforcement officials recommend placing selected indoor lights on timers to make your home appears to be inhabited. If the time of day can be varied for them to come on, it will not only provide security, but will save money from having them on 24 hours per day.

Common sense should rule your process of safety and efficiency. There are many ways to ensure against an inadvertent electrical fire while you are away, as well as not wasting energy if no one is around to use it.

Be smart, safe, and enjoy the time away!





Whether digging holes, climbing trees, or flying kites, outdoor play often creates beautiful childhood memories. Before hitting the great outdoors, discuss electrical safety with your children.

FLYING FUN

While flying kites, model airplanes, remote-control flying toys and drones, stay in large, open areas (such as parks or fields), far away from power lines. If an item does get caught in a power line, teach children to never try to retrieve it. Instead, an adult should call the electric utility for help.

GENERAL OUTDOOR SAFETY TIPS

Other important safety guidelines for kids and adults alike include:

- Never throw objects at power lines.
- Stay far away from downed, damaged or lowhanging power lines. An adult should call 911 to report a downed or damaged line.
- Be cautious after a severe storm causes a power outage. Downed power lines could be hidden under water, snow, or storm debris. Wait to go outside until power has been restored.
- Do not climb, sit or play on padmount transformers.
- Do not climb trees that have overhead power lines near or running through them.

POOLSIDE

When spending time by the pool, look up before using pool skimmers or other long objects to be sure you are not getting close to an overhead power line. If you are swimming and feel a prickly or tingling sensation, do not stay in the pool. There could be a stray electric current from a downed power line or a damaged electrical device. Also, never play in a flooded street or ditch; a downed power line could be hidden by the water and fallen debris.

PREVENTION IS KEY

Electric shock and injuries are often preventable. Empower your family with electrical safety knowledge to avoid preventable electric injuries.

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60 MINUTE HOT ROLLS

INGREDIENTS

- 2 packages yeast
- 1/2 cup water (110°F)
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 egg
- 4 tbsp melted butter
- 4-5 cups flour
- 2 tbsp sugar

Step 1: Dissolve sugar and yeast in warm water. Then mix in flour, salt, yeast, egg, and melted butter to form dough.

Step 2: Mix dough with a dough hook then turn on to a floured surface. Knead dough and add more flour as needed.

Step 3: Place dough in an oiled pan and cover with plastic wrap, allowing to rise for 15 minutes.

Step 4: Once dough has risen punch down and divide into rolls. Add rolls to baking sheet and bake at 425°F for 12-15 minutes. Brush with butter and serve.
