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Maintaining A High Standard Daniel Webster General Manager

Chief Executive Officer (CEO)

I've yet to encounter an individual, present company included, who enjoyed paying more for anything. Digging

deeper into the pocketbook is never fun. We seem especially reluctant to embrace this notion when it comes to our utility bills. As a bill-paying member here at Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative, I get it. I'm no different than anyone else when it comes to paying more out-of-pocket for energy consumption; I'm not a fan.

As general manager here at NOEC, however, I know how hard we work across the organization to keep costs low while maintaining high standards of service and system reliability. And I've witnessed how much we tighten the belt until we reach the last notch and it can be tightened no more.

We have a standing commitment to closely evaluate every penny spent in an effort to insulate our membership from paying more for electricity—despite the rising costs associated with operating a distribution utility in a challenging economy. Trust me when I say a rate increase isn't a decision we take lightly. Even though the Oklahoma Corporation Commission allows regulated utilities to implement an annual revenue increase of up to three percent, we've been able to prevent implementing an increase above three percent since 2011.

Again, it is incumbent upon us here at the Cooperative to be good stewards with what we've been entrusted. That's why it's never easy to request a rate study. After careful consideration, however, our Board of Trustees approved a proposed rate increase during its October 2024 meeting. A decision from the Oklahoma Corporation Commission (OCC) will be forthcoming, following a comprehensive analysis of our rate structure.

Christmas Tree

- Inspect holiday lights each year for frayed wires, bare spots, gaps in the insulation, broken/cracked sockets, and excessive kinking/wear before putting them up.
- Use only lights listed by an approved testing laboratory.
- Make sure your tree is at least 3 feet away from heat sources like fireplaces, radiators, and space heaters.
- If using an artificial tree, ensure it is labeled as fireresistant.
- If using a live tree, ensure it is properly **watered**. A dry tree is a fire hazard.

▶ If approved, an increase in retail rates will offset the rising cost of doing business, including wholesale power, equipment/fleet vehicles, and supplies/materials. Our system improvement construction efforts are also as strong as they've ever been as we work to ensure greater system reliability.

While there is never a "good time" for a rate increase, we have pledged to work hard to minimize its impact on our membership by carefully managing costs and searching for ways to operate more efficiently. Stability remains our constant objective as we look to solidify our Cooperative for both current and future members.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on August 26, 2024, Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative, Inc. ("NOEC" or "Applicant") filed its Application and supporting documentation seeking to increase its rates and charges for retail electric service to its customers and seeking approval of the Commission for the filing of appropriate tariffs reflecting such increases in rates in compliance with the Commission's Minimum Standard Filing Requirements, OAC 165:70.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that in its Application, NOEC proposes to implement a rate increase of approximately \$4.5 million, effective upon a Commission order approving NOEC's Application. Applicant alleges the same to be a fair, just, and reasonable rate. The specifics of NOEC's requests are set forth in the testimony and exhibits filed pursuant to the Commission's Minimum Standard Filing Requirements.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the increase, as proposed by NOEC, would raise an average residential customer's current bill by approximately 5.1%. This equals to about \$7.83 per month on the average residential customer bill.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the Hearing on the Merits is set before an Administrative Law Judge on January 23, 2025, at 10:00 a.m., at the Concourse Theater, Suite C50, Will Rogers Memorial Office Building, 2401 N. Lincoln Blvd., in the Capitol Complex, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73105 and public comment will be taken at that time. The Hearing on the Merits will resume on February 27, 2025, at 10:00 a.m., in the Concourse Theater, Suite C50, and shall continue each day until concluded. The Concourse Theater is located in the tunnel between the Will Rogers Memorial Office Building and the Sequoyah Memorial Office Building.

our times each year, Northeast Oklahoma
Electric Cooperative employees have an
opportunity to model one of the most important
cooperative principles.

Let's face it. All **seven** cooperative principles are important, but principle number seven, *Concern for Community*, ranks right up there at the top for our conscientious employees. Any time they have a chance to make a difference in their respective communities—and especially if that difference means potentially saving a life—well, you can sign them up.

At no time is **Concern for Community** more evident for NOEC employees than during one of our organization's four yearly blood drives.



Once every quarter, NOEC partners with **Our Blood Institute (OBI)** to host a blood drive at the cooperative's Vinita headquarters location. OBI is a local, non-profit blood bank that provides blood products to **90%** of the state's medical facilities.

In 2024 alone, NOEC employees donated 67 units during drives held in February, June, August, and November. Since each donation can save up to three lives, that's as many as **201 lives impacted**.

The June blood drive was especially meaningful for NOEC employees. It was on that day that we were able to rally around one of our own linemen and his family.

NOEC was honored to host the first-ever Jayten Campbell Memorial Blood Drive at cooperative headquarters on June 3. The drive netted 21 units, including 17 whole blood, and four double red blood cell donations.

▶ **Jayten** was the young son of NOEC Journeyman Lineman/Serviceman Jared Campbell. Jayten was born with a rare liver disease known as biliary atresia. He was diagnosed two months after he was born and battled the disease for several months before his passing on November 1, 2015. As a way to honor Jayten's memory, the Campbell family wanted to plan an event centered around blood donation, which was crucial to Jayten's battle.

"We are thankful that your family, the community, and your family's work colleagues chose to remember Jayten by donating blood in his honor," OBI Account Consultant Jade Brown told the Cambell family following the drive.

Another blood drive held in Jayten's honor was held two days earlier, on June 1, at the Grove Regional Airport. That drive drew nine donors.

"Overall, between both blood drives, there were a net total of thirty blood donors which means up to ninety lives were saved," Brown said.

NOEC employees are proud to support community blood banks as they strive to put all seven cooperative principles into practice.

"We are very thankful for the employees at NOEC and all that they do," said Brown. "Every three seconds there is patient in need of blood. Locally, we depend on 1,200 units daily to keep up with the supply. We are only able to do that because of dedicated donors like yourselves."

Why donate?

- Only 10% of eligible individuals actually donate.
- One donation can save up to 3 lives.
- Every 2 seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood.
- More than 1.2K donations are needed every day for local hospitals.

TUNA PARTY LOG | WANDA WOOD OF COLCORD



INGREDIENTS

- 2 cans tuna
- 1 package cream cheese
- 1 TBS lemon juice
- 2 tsp grated or minced onion
- 1 tsp horseradish
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp liquid smoke
- 1 or 2 cups chopped pecans
- 2 TBS chopped parsley

Step 1: Drain tuna then combine with cream cheese, lemon juice, onion, horseradish, salt, and liquid smoke; mix thoroughly and then chill for several hours.

Step 2: Combine pecans and parsley and set aside.

Step 3: Shape tuna mixture into a 8x2 inch log then roll in pecan and parsley mixture and chill well

Step 4: Pass the crackers and enjoy!

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cans corn, drained
- 1/2 red bell pepper, chopped
- 1/2 green bell pepper, chopped
- 1/2 purple onion, chopped
- 1 cup mayonnaise

- 5 oz of chili
- Fritos corn chips, chili cheese flavor
