

AT REC DAY 2025

onditions were ripe for a record and that's

exactly what occurred on September 11

at the 87th REC Day.

Energized by the 9/11 Day of Remembrance and an opportunity to participate in the cooperative's democratic process, Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative members turned out en masse at **REC Day** 2025. A total of **2,815** NOEC members were greeted by an afternoon of beautiful weather as they showed up and shattered the all-time registration of 2,590 set three years ago at the first-ever Thursday afternoon drive-thru event. Requirements for quorum were met at 3:05 p.m., a

REC Day 2025 was held at four locations across NOEC service territory: the Craig County Fairgrounds in Vinita, the Mayes County Fairgrounds in Pryor, the Delaware County Fairgrounds in Jay, and the Miami Fairgrounds. The Vinita site led the way with **816** members registered, followed by Jay at 783 registrations, Pryor at **628**, and Miami with **588**. This year's event marked the return of a Delaware County site after a one-year hiatus due to unavailability in 2024.

little over an hour after the official start of the event.

Since the adoption of the drive-thru format in 2019, the cooperative has eclipsed the 2,000-member registration benchmark six consecutive years, establishing new registration records three of those years. The format is popular because it brings annual meeting closer to members, making participation in the event more convenient.

New this year was an opportunity for cooperative members to register with purpose. In rememberance of the anniversary of 9/11, two dollars from every member registration at REC Day 2025 was donated to the 9/11 Memorial & Museum. Local firefighters also passed the boot for anyone wanting to make a personal donation to this meaningful cause. At the Vinita location, local firefighters passed the boot for those wishing to contribute to the families of the two individuals involved in the August 18 turnpike collision that claimed the life of firefighter Zac Rinehart.

Thanks to NOEC members, a total of \$10,641.18 was donated to the 9/11 Memorial & Museum—\$5,360 from member registrations and \$5,011.18 in direct member donations in the firefighters "pass the boot" campaign.

"We have a caring and conscientious membership to thank for making this a special day for our entire organization," remarked NOEC General Manager Daniel Webster.

"Not only were we able to celebrate our individual freedoms as cooperative members by participating in the democratic process, we were also able to recognize an important event in our country's history while also assisting two local families enduring a difficult season of life. Yes, we set a new registration record, which was memorable, but more importantly we made an impact that was meaningful."

Along with an opportunity to vote in the annual trustee election, each registered NOEC member received a \$20 electric bill credit just for attending **REC Day** 2025. Members were also presented with a souvenir hat and entered into the big **REC Day** 2025 prize drawings—all without leaving their vehicles.

During the general election portion of the meeting, members confirmed three nominated candidates vying for a seat on the cooperative board of trustees. Incumbent trustees Mike Detherage of Fairland (District 2), Jim Wade of Salina (District 7), and Jimmy Caudill of Grove (District 9) all retained their seats unopposed.

More than \$25,000 in electric credits and cash were divided among 38 drawing winners following the event. The \$5,000 cash grand prize was awarded to one lucky winner. Electric credits of \$1,000, \$500, and \$250 were awarded to winners in each of the cooperative's nine districts. A \$500 electric credit was presented to a member from each district who registered using the barcode page included with their August bill. A bonus \$500 cash drawing was held for members who completed the survey form on the back of their September 2025 Northeast Connection publication (inside Oklahoma Living magazine) and brought it with them when they registered at **REC Day**.

"Thank you, NOEC members, for rallying once again to support your cooperative and a great cause at our 87th REC Day," Webster reiterated. "It was a historic day and you should all be proud of the role you played in making that happen. Again, thank you to all who attended and made this day memorable."

SUPPORTING AREA SCHOOLS THROUGH TAX DISTRIBUTIONS

ortheast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative paid gross receipts tax totaling \$1,774,070.75 in 2025 and the total was divided among the 32 schools in the cooperative service area.

Not-for-profit electric cooperatives are **exempt** from paying federal income tax. However, they **do pay** fuel, state and federal unemployment tax, Social Security, Medicare and **gross receipts tax**, in lieu of the ad-valorem tax paid by for-profit utility companies.

Gross receipts tax collected for a given year represents two percent of each member's electric bill. Ninety-five percent of this tax is paid directly to schools within our service area, based on the miles of line the cooperative maintains within each school district. The remaining five percent of the collected gross receipts tax is withheld by the state for collection and handling fees.

By paying a percentage of the cooperative's gross income to support area school districts, Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative members are sharing in the responsibility of educating today's youth. The table provided below lists the school systems and the amounts they received.

- **Replace** batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- **Test** detectors to ensure they function properly.

INCREASE ENERGY EFFICIENCY

- **Seal** gaps at windows and doors with weatherstripping or caulk.
- Set ceiling fans to **rotate clockwise**.

• PREPARE PIPES & WATER SUPPLY

- **Insulate** exposed pipes to prevent freezing.
- **Drain and shut off** outdoor faucets and irrigation systems.
- Know the **location** of water shut-off valve in case of emergency.

PREPARE YOUR HOME'S EXTERIOR

- **Clear** gutters and downspouts to prevent ice dams.
- **Trim** trees away from the house to avoid damage.
- **Ensure** downspouts extend away from the foundation.
- **Service and store** equipment such as lawnmowers and trimmers.

OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLEFOR AREA STUDENTS, TEACHERS

Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative (NOEC) is announcing its **youth programs** for the current school year and wants to make sure all eligible students have an opportunity to participate. Along with four \$2,000 college scholarships, the cooperative is sponsoring an all-expense-paid trip to our nation's capital for two students.

► YOUTH TOUR COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECT (OR ESSAY)

Area high school juniors can complete a 6-8 hour community service project for a chance to win an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., June 13-19, as part of the 2026 Youth Tour contest. Winning students will also receive \$500 in spending cash. As an alternative form of entry, students can submit a 300-500 word essay on the topic "Making a Difference Where I Live." Students who are in the eleventh grade and attend school within cooperative service area are eligible to participate in this contest. Cooperative membership is not a requirement.

Entry deadline: January 25, 2026.

► COLLEGE/TRADE SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP

High school seniors whose parents or guardians are NOEC members and who live in a household served by NOEC electric can apply for a \$2,000 scholarship to a college, university, or trade school of their choosing. Four winners will be selected.

Entry deadline: April 3, 2026.

► CLASSROOM INCENTIVE

NOEC is encouraging area teachers to get involved. If a teacher administers the Youth Tour Community Service Project (or essay) as part of a classroom assignment and produces a contest finalist, he or she could be rewarded with \$100 toward the purchase of classroom materials or equipment.

RECIPES FROM DELAWARE CO.





OLD TIME CAKE DOUGHNUTS | PATTY GIBE, GROVE

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tsp butter, softened
- 1 1/2 cup sugar, divided
- 3 large eggs
- 3 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1/8 tsp pumpkin pie spice
- 4 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 3/4 cup 2% milk
- Oil for frying

Step 1: In a large bowl beat butter and 1 cup sugar until crumbly, about 2 minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each one.

Step 2: Combine flour, baking powder, 1 tsp cinnamon, salt, and pumpkin pie spice together and add to butter mixture, alternating with splashes of milk, beating after each addition.

Step 3: Cover and refrigerate for 2 hours. Once chilled turn dough on to a heavily floured surface and pat to a 1/4 inch in thickness. Then cut with a 2 1/2 inch doughnut cutter.

Step 4: In a deep skillet or deep fryer heat oil to 375°F and cook doughnuts on each side. Remove from oil and drain on paper towels. Roll doughnuts in remaining sugar and cinnamon to coat.

PEANUT BRITTLE CANDY | REJEANIA MARTIN, AFTON

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup white corn syrup
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups raw peanuts (unsalted, no skins)
- 1 Tbsp butter
- 2 tsp baking soda

Step 1: Boil sugar, water, and syrup until it forms a small ball. Then add peanuts and butter. Boil until light golden brown.

Step 2: Remove from heat then add vanilla and baking soda, mixing well. Once combined quickly pour onto buttered cookie sheet, quickly!

Step 3: Brittle should be just under a 1/2 inch thick. Let it spread on its own. Once cooled, break a part into pieces.
