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TECHNOLOGY THAT POWERS OUR FUTURE

Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative continues to lead the way in delivering reliable, efficient, and safe electric service to its membership by embracing advanced technologies such as **SCADA—Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition**. That's a fancy name for a powerful system that has become a cornerstone of NOEC's operational excellence, transforming the way the cooperative monitors, manages, and maintains its electrical infrastructure.

SCADA allows us to remotely track system performance in real time, from substations to field equipment spread across thousands of miles of service territory. Through an integrated network of sensors, communication links, and control systems, the cooperative can instantly detect outages, voltage fluctuations, and equipment issues. This means faster response times, fewer disruptions, and improved service reliability for members.

Our line crews in the past had to be dispatched to identify and locate system faults. The "manual" process was both time-consuming and costly. Today, SCADA pinpoints the exact location of the problem within seconds, enabling targeted repairs and dramatically reducing downtime. The same system also helps NOEC analyze long-term trends, optimize power distribution, and plan for future load growth.

Beyond efficiency, SCADA enhances safety by providing early warnings of potential equipment failure and maintaining better control of energized systems.

As NOEC continues to modernize its grid, SCADA serves as a critical foundation for future innovations such as advanced metering, renewable integration, and smart grid technologies. Thanks to tools like SCADA, Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative is actively reinforcing its commitment to dependable service, operational excellence, and a brighter, more resilient energy future for its members.

HILL, SMILEY COMPLETE CCC PROGRAM

It wasn't long ago that the NOEC Public Relations team was awarded the highest honor possible among the state's thirty electric cooperatives. The group proudly accepted the Cooperative Communicator of the Year Award in 2022 from the Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives.

And now, just a few years later, the NOEC PR team finds itself celebrating another noteworthy achievement.

Two members of the five-person group recently completed the challenging requirements of the **Certified Cooperative Communicator (CCC)** program. Multimedia specialist Erin Hill and marketing specialist Alyssa Smiley both completed the CCC course in 2025, adding yet another feather to the cap of both our PR department and cooperative.

A graduation ceremony for Hill, Smiley and 33 other CCC program participants from across the U.S. was held September 18 at the NRECA branch headquarters in Madison, Wisconsin.

In addition to receiving over 110 hours of instruction, CCC cohorts build strong, long-lasting relationships they will carry with them throughout their careers. Participants develop valuable work products, such as strategic communication plans, crisis communication plans, or marketing/branding guides they can immediately implement at their respective cooperatives.

TAYLOR COMPLETES CFPC PROGRAM

Congratulations to NOEC Director of Accounting Leslie Taylor on her recent completion of the **Cooperative Financial Professional Certificate (CFPC)** program.

The CFPC program is a competency-based, interactive program for cooperative financial professionals and non-finance managers seeking to deepen their understanding of electric cooperative utility finance. It is offered through a partnership between the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) and the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation (NRUCFC).

The CFPC program is offered twice yearly (spring and fall) and is limited each time to thirty participants. Taylor selected the spring option. The first was held at the Fluno Center in Madison, Wisconsin, April 28-May 2, and the second at CFC headquarters in Dulles, Virginia, June 9-13.

Taylor completed a series of online conferences in between the in-person sessions and then finished it all off with a final capstone project. The focus of her final project was to streamline budgeting with the NISC CFC Budget Pro Module, leveraging historical data and integrated tools for more accurate financial planning.





OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE FOR AREA STUDENTS, TEACHERS

Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative (NOEC) is announcing its **youth programs** for the current school year and wants to make sure all eligible students have an opportunity to participate. Along with four \$2,000 college scholarships, the cooperative is sponsoring an all-expense-paid trip to our nation's capital for two students.

► YOUTH TOUR COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECT (OR ESSAY)

Area high school juniors can complete a 6-8 hour community service project for a chance to win an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., June 13-19, as part of the 2026 Youth Tour contest. Winning students will also receive \$500 in spending cash. As an alternative form of entry, students can submit a 300-500 word essay on the topic *"Making a Difference Where I Live."* Students who are in the eleventh grade and attend school within cooperative service area are eligible to participate in this contest. Cooperative membership is not a requirement.

Entry deadline: January 25, 2026.

► CLASSROOM INCENTIVE

NOEC is encouraging area teachers to get involved. If a teacher administers the Youth Tour Community Service Project (or essay) as part of a classroom assignment and produces a contest finalist, he or she could be rewarded with \$100 toward the purchase of classroom materials or equipment.

Students who are in the eleventh grade and attend public, private, charter, or home school within cooperative service area are eligible to participate in this contest. Cooperative membership is not a contest requirement.

HONOR FLIGHT NETWORK SALUTES OUR VETERANS

HONOR FLIGHT NETWORK VISION

A nation where all of America's veterans experience the honor, gratitude, and community of support they deserve. In furtherance of this common goal, we have the enormous privilege of showing our nation's veterans the appreciation and honor they deserve.

Our country has been observing a day for veterans in one form or another for well over a century.

It began in 1919 with the first celebration of **Armistice Day**. Then-president Woodrow Wilson commemorated an end to World War I hostilities on the first anniversary of the conflict's armistice. Terms were reached one year earlier at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month that formally concluded the war between Allied Forces and Axis powers.

Armistice Day was first recognized by Congress in 1926 and became a federal holiday in 1938, but it was always primarily meant to celebrate World War I veterans only. The renaming of Armistice Day came about in 1954, following both World War II and the Korean War. The word armistice was changed to veterans to honor veterans of all American wars, and the annual federal holiday has been known as **Veterans Day** ever since.

Over the last 70 years, the occasion has celebrated and remembered all who have served in the military, both in wartime and peace.

THE HONOR FLIGHT NETWORK

Fast forward several decades to find an organization whose mission is to actively celebrate our nation's veterans by inviting them to share in a day of honor at our nation's memorials.

Founded 20 years ago, **Honor Flight Network** is a nonprofit organization comprised of 128 independent hubs in 46 states across the U.S. The organization was created to honor our nation's veterans by bringing them to Washington, D.C., where they visit the memorials built to commemorate their service and sacrifice.

▶ Initially focused on America's World War II veterans, Honor Flight Network now includes those who served in the military during the Korean and Vietnam War eras, along with veterans of any service era who are critically ill. Honor Flight Network transports approximately 22,500 veterans annually and has flown over 300,000 veterans and counting to Washington, D.C. since its inception.

Participation in Honor Flight gives veterans the opportunity to share the significant occasion with other veterans, remember the fallen, and convey their stories and experiences with their peers. Veterans always travel free of charge, thanks to generous donations to the organization.

Each hub and volunteer are crucial components in making the Honor Flight mission a success. Their time and talents are freely donated to coordinate flights, bus trips, welcome home ceremonies, thousands of phone calls and so much more—all with the common goal to honor our nation's heroes with the trip of a lifetime.

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OKLAHOMA WARRIOR'S HONOR FLIGHT

The state of Oklahoma joined the Honor Flight Network in April 2017. Colcord resident and NOEC member Lana Hurt is the hub director for the state. There are also 14 unpaid board members who volunteer many hours to help make the local hub a success.

She said **Oklahoma Warriors Honor Flight** made its eleventh mission this past October 7.

"Counting the veterans on that flight, we have been blessed to have taken over 800 veterans to Washington, D.C.," said Hurt.

She added that around 400 people attended the sendoff program and enjoyed guest speaker Douglas McClain, himself retired military and a former Blue Angels pilot. She said there were approximately 450 people waiting at Tulsa International Airport to welcome the returning veterans home later that night.

Hurt explained that each flight costs approximately \$130,000, all of which is raised from donations, grants, sponsors, and fundraisers. Like its parent network, Oklahoma Warriors Honor Flight is a 501(c)3 nonprofit with all proceeds donated or raised going to cover any travel costs associated with the flights.

"We normally take two flights a year, but we were only able to have one flight this past year due to lack of funding," she said.

Hurt explained that each participating veteran has a "guardian" assigned to them.

"A guardian is there to make it the best day possible for the veterans," she said. "Some family members go as guardians for the veterans."

For guardians, a \$600 fee covers airfare, ground transportation, meals, and an Honor Flight shirt and backpack.

"There are 149 total people on each flight," said Hurt. "This includes 65-70 veterans, guardians, medical staff, flight staff, and we normally have a TV station from Oklahoma City and one from Tulsa, as well as KRMG go with us on the flight."

The morning of each honor flight, three charter buses transport the group from the Hard Rock Casino to Tulsa International Airport. An escort is provided by the Tulsa Police Department and Patriot Guard Riders.

"We board the plane, and usually land at Reagan Airport around 10 a.m.," Hurt explained. "There again we have charter buses waiting for us. While in D.C., we visit the WWII, Korean, Vietnam, Air Force, Lincoln, and Marine memorials, as well as watch the Changing of the Guard at Arlington National Cemetery. We then head back to board the plane and head home to Tulsa."

Hurt said there is a waiting list of 250 Vietnam veterans.

"If not for these honor flights the majority of our veterans would never get to experience this once-in-a-lifetime trip," said Hurt. "Time is running out for many of the veterans on our waiting list. As I was in the process of calling the veterans for the October flight, there were five who had passed away. Six others were unable to go because their health had deteriorated so much. We also had a Vietnam veteran pass away a week after the flight."

She added: "These flights are so much more than just a free trip to Washington, D.C., to visit the memorials. They are also a healing trip that brings closure for a lot of the veterans who haven't had that."

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AN OKLAHOMA CONNECTION

Northeast Oklahoma Electric Cooperative was a proud sponsor of **Oklahoma Warriors Honor Flight** in 2025. NOEC Director Public Relations Kelsie Wilson accompanied Pawhuska resident and Vietnam Veteran George Mader on his recent flight to our nation's capital.

Wilson said she was truly humbled by the experience and was appreciative of the chance to spend the day with Mader.

"It's hard to put into words how grateful I am for the opportunity to be there for George during this experience," said Wilson. "Watching the veterans share stories, laughter, and even moments of sadness was a blessing. The entire day felt as if they were all transported back in time to their youth."

Wilson said her time with Mader was unforgettable.

"I truly believe he was assigned to me by fate," she said. "We immediately hit it off and had a wonderful time together. From the moment I was introduced to him to the moment we returned to the hotel for our final goodbyes, it felt as if I had known him my entire life—like family."

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Added Wilson: "George has left a lasting impact on my life and will forever hold a special place in my heart. I will never forget the light in his eyes during the welcome home parade. He was in utter disbelief that so many people came out just to celebrate him and his service to our country. His first welcome home, when he returned from Vietnam, was nothing like the one he received that day. Seeing him finally receive the recognition he deserved was one of the most moving experiences of my life. He kept saying, 'That was awesome. Wow. If that doesn't touch your heart, I don't know what could.'"



CHERRY NO-BAKE CHEESECAKE | CARLA FISHER, VINITA

INGREDIENTS

- 1 Graham cracker pie crust
- 8 oz soft cream cheese
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/3 cup lemon juice
- 1 can Eagle brand condensed milk
- 1 can cherry pie filling

Step 1: Mix cream cheese and milk in a blender until fluffy. Then stir in lemon juice and vanilla extract.

Step 2: Fill pie crust with mixture, cover, and refrigerate for two hours until firm. Remove from refrigerator and top with cherry pie filling.

Step 3: Cool pie in refrigerator before serving to set the topping and enjoy!

HONEY PECAN PIE | JUDITH WAYLAND, WELCH

INGREDIENTS

- 4 eggs
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 cup light corn syrup

Topping

- 3 Tbs butter
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 3 Tbs honey
- 1 1/2 cup pecan halves

Step 1: Beat eggs and then add remaining ingredients. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake at 350°F for 30 minutes.

Step 2: While first part is baking, make topping by melting butter. Then stir in brown sugar and honey until sugar is melted. Add pecans halves, stirring until coated. When pie has baked for 30 minutes gently spoon topping over pie and bake an additional 20-30 minutes.
